The Railway Vintage Festival Saturday 1st July 2023



There was no better way to commemorate the 180th Anniversary of the Ashford Railway Works and the 175th Anniversary of Newtown Railway Works than with the fantastic, vibrant and massively successful Railway Vintage Festival held at Newtown Green Saturday 1st July 2023.

Organised by South Willesborough and Newtown Community Council and sponsored by Ashford Borough Council and Ashford International Development Company, with amazing professional acts from London and Brighton performing iconic music and dance through the eras of the 1920s to the 1960s when the last steam train left Ashford.

Chair of SWANCC Cllr Sue Mullan, remarked "This Railway Vintage Festival has been a tremendous success due to a year of hard work and planning by SWANCC, but the key to its successful delivery has been the sponsorship from Ashford Borough Council with Ashford International Development Company and the indomitable SWAN Community Spirit volunteering to facilitate this fabulous festival it has really put South Willesborough and Newtown on the map! Thank you to everyone involved in making today a success." Top class acts also performing on the community stage with wonderful local talent that demonstrated the creative and high-quality ability in the SWAN area was a roaring success. Enjoyed by community and visitors alike, the event hosted a wide array of classic cars and vintage stalls and handcrafted market stalls. A land train ran rides around the Green for the whole day and the funfair was a fantastic attraction.

South Willesborough and Newtown Community Council worked tirelessly to ensure the event was a fitting tribute to the important role Newtown Railway Works has had on the area. Reflecting the history of the area with a Community Memories tent hosted the Newtown Railway History Exhibition produced by local Historian Ani from Tales on the tracks, residents brought their own memorabilia diaries and photographs to give a rich tapestry of local history and memories of the life of Newtown Railway Works. Continuing the historical elements of the day exhibitions were also on display from AIMREC with model railway layouts produced for the Kings Coronation and displays from Ashford Museum.

With eyes to the exciting future for Ashford, residents and visitors were able to engage with the exciting development at



Newtown Railway Works and Members from Ashford International Development Company.

The Mayor Cllr Larry Krause and Deputy Mayor Cllr Lyn Suddards attended the event and with Chair Cllr Sue Mullan and Vice Chair Cllr Andy Rogers planted trees in memory of Her Majesty the Queen Elizabeth and Cllr George Koowaree.

It was a wonderful occasion for the wide family of George Kooware to gather and have a family reunion at the event, The Deputy Mayor gave a speech in trbute to ClIr George Koowaree's life and work and for SWANCC it was a privilege to mark the legacy and life of ClIr Kooware on Newtown Green.

Vice Chair of SWANCC Cllr Andy Rogers said "Newtown has not seen an event of this scale for many years. Hopefully this is just the beginning of the vibrant future for South Willesborough and Newtown and Ashford as a whole community with the exciting development of Ashford International Studios".

The Railway Vintage Festival included an exciting world record attempt for the largest human image of a train, with adjudicators from Ashford Borough Council and many Community Marshalls. SWAN made a valiant attempt to form the human image of a train but unfortunately on this attempt was not able to secure a strong enough image on this occasion. However, that said the image does capture the fun and community spirit of the day.

Thank you to Sharon Barton for writing and reading the Community Poem, especially for the Railway Vintage Festival this year. It is a wonderful tribute to the rich Heritage and History of Newtown.

The eighteen forties, in a small town, Rail lines from London crept their way down.

A new industry with jobs for all. Later, a clock tower, standing tall.

It watched as men travelled through the

gate, Checking for sure they wouldn't be late. Six hundred passed through, morning and night.

Came from afar to get to the site.

Houses were built, at first, just a few. Fairly fast, a community grew. A school, bathhouse, a pub to pop down. Named Alfred Town, but known as New Town

Rail routes expanded, out to the coast, Ashford, the centre, able to boast. The town was expanding, people came, By horse and carriage, and now by train.

In sixty years populations grew. Men built the trains, but women too. Only nine girls, pre-world war one, Thirteen hundred men, fathers and sons.

Eight hundred of these, were then called

To fight for their country, some so young. Women were asked now, to fill the gap, This place with a target on its back. Gladys Sparkes, starting out, at eighteen Struck down, by an enemy, unseen The only civilian casualty That Ashford, in this war, would see.

But, so many lost in both World Wars, Those who survived them, left with deep scars. As good times and bad, all came and went, The railways thrived and spread through Kent.

After the war came investment in roads, Government cuts caused stations to close. Newtown Works, sadly, wasn't shielded, With fewer lines, less stock was needed.

Then by the sixties, so much was lost, When part of it closed, to families' cost. The rest of the site stayed twenty years

Before crumbling and closing the door.

The railway lived on, fought it's way

Bright innovations brought something new. A tunnel proposed, England to France, Controversy rose, but they took the chance.

The nineteen nineties, success was seen, As tunnellers met, under the sea. Freight went through first, followed by cars, Drove onto the train, and off into France.

London to Paris, just two hours, Companies soon saw speed as power. Looked at Ashford and London alike, Stations were built, new, clean, and bright.

The works were left empty, for years forlorn, But never forgotten, each person torn. This community has fought hands down, For this, the heritage of Newtown

They've stood strong together, through the years.

During the joy, laughter, sadness and tears. Fresh ideas have come to the site. So!

Maybe, this story still has more bite....

South Willesborough and Newtown Community Council commenced its second term in May 2023 with an uncontested election.

The Annual Meeting was held 9th May 2023 and Cllr Sue Mullan continues as Chair with Vice Chair Cllr Andy Rogers, Cllr David Mullan, Cllr Eric Parkinson, Cllr Nirosha Thilagarajan, Cllr Andy Hodges and Cllr Steve Campkin continue as Members and are joined by Cllr David Smith formerly Ward Cllr for Aylesford and East Stour. SWANCC said a sad goodbye to Cllr Peter Porter who left in May 2023 and also to Cllr Jacky Godden, however Jacky remains as a member of the Planting and Biodiversity working group.

Work began in earnest from day 1 of this term for the Council with the implementation of the SWAN Environment Strategy for 2023 and 2024, and the delivery of the Railway Vintage Festival. This was held on Saturday 1st of July 2023, it was a fantastic event for the whole community and you can read more in this newsletter and review the photographs from the day.

Over the coming months SWANCC will be working to continue to improve the look and feel of the SWAN area with the active work of the Planting and Biodiversity working group and its volunteers.

Highways Improvement Plan

Since its resident wide Consultations on parking and the SWAN area in 2019 and 2020, SWANCC have been lobbying for improved measures to manage Speeding, Parking and Congestion in SWAN area with support from KCC Cllr Steve Campkin for the area.

SWANCC are very pleased to advise it has now been dedicated a Communications Engagement Officer from KCC to progress a Highways Improvement Plan for South Willesborough and Newtown. This will consider the wide-reaching priorities for the management of Parking and Congestion, Speeding and further Highways Works.

This project requires significant investment, inter agency working and a Design Scheme by KCC, followed by a Regulation Traffic Order. This will then allow speed indicator devices, double yellow lines or other solutions to be put in place and will be a tremendous improvement to the safety and connectivity of SWAN.

SWANCC will keep residents updated on its progress and the development of this project over the coming year.

SWANCC would like to thank all the residents who have contributed to the consultations as this has been absolutely key to forming the priorities for Highways Improvements in this area

Community Gardening in SWAN


The SWAN Environment Strategy over 2023 / 2024, to support the SWAN Community plan objectives of creating the best look and feel for the area, is being rolled out over this year.

In the last edition of SWAN News it was reported that SWANCC Planting and Biodiversity working group formed a group of volunteers from the SWAN area who worked tirelessly to hand plant 10,000 bulbs across the SWAN area.

Newtown Green took on a glorious display of golden daffodils, The raised beds in Wainwright Place and Alfred Road as well as Albion Place and Royds Road in South Willesborough. These were all tidied and planted with bulbs for the Spring and gave a wonderful display.

The Community of Volunteers grew and met most Wednesdays to plant various areas of SWAN with wildflower seeds which were somewhat hampered by the weather but will be replanted with more seeds and red poppies for the Autumn and REMEMBRANCE in November.

The next focus will be to locate areas in SWAN that would benefit from tree planting. The environmental benefits of trees is well known and their ability to shade and reduce urban heat areas is well known.



Community gardening

Whether it's greening a local area, starting a food growing project or conserving an area for wildlife – community gardening can have a huge impact for both people and places Royal Horticultural Society

To support this focus SWANCC aim to hire a Community Gardener to maintain the planting and to manage the exciting community gardening projects at Gas House Fields Allotments. This will create wonderful opportunities to create new social connections improve wellbeing and improve the natural environment and impact climate change. Community Gardening in SWAN

With the planned hire of a Community Gardener at SWANCC, Spring 2024 will see the launch of a Community Allotment Club in the Spring of 2024.

This will be led by the SWANCC Community Gardener and meet on a regular basis over the Spring to plant and grow vegetables for the benefit of the SWAN community. With all the tools, equipment and planting provided and the guidance of the Community Gardener it will be a fantastic

opportunity to learn how to grow vegetables on an allotment and meet like-minded people interested in community gardening. With a charge of only £5 for a years' membership it is a great opportunity to be involved in a Community Gardening project. The produce grown through the Community Allotment Club will be for the benefit of SWAN residents and these will be distributed by the Salvation Army Ashford team at the Friday Food and Chat and in emergency food parcels for those in need.

Book a bed scheme

The Book a bed scheme will see 1m plots made available for residents of SWAN who would like the benefit of growing vegetables and accessing the open space at Gas House Fields Allotments, but perhaps the demands of a full allotment are not practical or manageable. The charge for this will be £5 for the year with a deposit of £25 for the space returnable if it is left clean and tidy at the end of the tenancy. This is an ideal opportunity to learn more about Allotmenteering and growing your own and will launch in Spring of 2024.

Living Workshop

The Living Workshop plot has begun its second cycle in Spring 2023. The planting was completed over the end of April and the May bank holiday by the Community Council Manager and Duke of Edinburgh student with assistance from the Site Adviser Stefan Heathfield.

The plot is an excellent example for tenants of how to keep their plots and which produce grows most successfully.

The first crops were harvested early July and ongoing through the summer months. All the produce is donated to Salvation Army on Fridays for the foodbank and benefit of local SWAN residents. The living workshop planting was fully funded this year by a kind donation from a resident following some sad vandalism during 2022, it is very much appreciated and the full donation has been put to good use.



Disabled Access Beds

The Gas House Fields Allotments Committee have been working to bring in disabled access ready raised beds with wheelchair friendly paths and parking facilities on the site. It is hoped these will be ready for use from the Spring of 2024. The new paths and parking will also alleviate the flooding at the main gates in the winter months and make life much easier for Gas House Fields tenants.

Many of you have now met me and I am pleased to say we have a Neighbourhood Watch scheme for every road in South Willesborough. (to join see below)

Neighbourhood Watch is about keeping you crime free but as important free from the fear of being a victim of crime also. Can we prevent the crime in the first place? Can we prevent similar crimes once one has been committed? Can we assist in investigations by the provision of evidence and intelligence? Can we learn lessons and go again into the community to prevent still further crimes and anticipate future trends?

So many crimes are avoidable and preventable.

Neighbourhood Watch is a two-way communication process. My job is to look at the crimes committed. Look at crime prevention advice and intelligence from around the County and see how I can best offer advice to residents to keep them safe and secure.

What are the main risks in your area?

- 1 Thefts from vehicles, please leave nothing on show inside a car when parking.
- Thefts from Sheds and Garages, please keep secure.
- 3 Theft of internet shopping parcels from doorsteps, delivery vans are followed.
- 4 Bogus callers and Rogue Traders, never agree to unsolicited work on your doorstep.
- 5 Trend crimes for example Catalytic Converters and Number plates.
- 6 SCAMS by Letter, Landline and mobile phones and any computer/
- 7 Anti Social behaviour and Criminal Damage
- 8 Drug problems which drive so many of the other crimes to fund their purchase,

Crime cannot flourish in communities that care" and it is very clear to me you all care.

Your council and all the councillors are very supportive of this work and to me personally. They care deeply about the residents and the community.





South Willesborough Beat Officer Josh Wheatley

I am delighted to introduce via the newsletter our Beat officer who joins SWANCC area as part of the new policing model for policing in Kent going forwards.

P.C. JOSH WHEATLEY is our officer and Josh is a very experienced officer and I have worked on public engagement meetings with him in other parts of the Ashford District.

The new policing model will develop over time and as Ashford are not yet at full establishment, we will welcome new members to the policing team at Ashford over the coming months.

We are still encouraging all contact to be directed into the csu. ashford@kent.police.uk email box which will ensure we can continue to respond in the most effective way during this period of transition.

The key contacts for each strand of the policing model are:

- Beat Officer team (ward-based engagement and problem solving) Sergeant Richard Batten
- Neighbourhood Task Force (district problem solving and partnership work) – Sergeant Kim Cameron
- Child Centred Policing Team Sergeant Katie Reed

Each ward across the District will now have a nominated Beat Officer and their primary role is to work within their local communities. The two area I wish to concentrate on from the above model are the

BEAT OFFICER TEAM and the NEIGHBOURHOOD TASK FORCE.

I know both Sergeant Richard Batten and Sergeant Kim Cameron and I have worked with both.

Josh is in the Beat Team, and they can call upon the Neighbourhood Task Team when required.

I think it very important to clarify the word Beat Officer. Sadly, resources do not allow P.C. Josh Wheatley to just police and patrol the South Willesborough and Newtown area and to give a full picture of the area he will cover I have set out the parts of the Ashford District which fall into his Beat Officer role.

Firstly, the areas Josh covers

So that should give residents a feel for the size of the tasks in hand for Josh and why he will need the total support of The SWAN Community Council, every councillor, myself with Neighbourhood Watch but most importantly each and every resident and family in the area.

Update from Ashford Borough Council Ward Member Cllr Sojan Joseph



Hello,

I am Sojan Joseph and I am one of the councillors for Aylesford and East Stour, elected this May to represent you at the Ashford Borough Council (ABC). Some of you may already know me as you have contacted me for advice or help. I have taken forward many issues raised by you.

I am working very closely with the SWAN community council members and KCC councillor to address the real issues facing our community. Other than the councillor work, I am a senior mental health nurse working in the local NHS.

Memories

Anyone working at the works at Ashford had ready access to a large group of craftsmen, skilled at metalwork, woodwork, leathercraft, upholstery, and many other skills. This meant many broken objects could be expertly repaired, from wooden furniture to metal machinery to very precise measurements. All for very modest costs, directly to the craftsmen concerned.

Furniture legs, traditional hinges and brackets, leather seat covers, clock parts, parts for old vehicles, were some of the most frequent requests. Together with strangely shaped pieces of wood and metal for elderly farmers and smallholders. Ashford Railway Works had a 50 tonne drop-power hammer and a huge open forge, together with lathes and presses and all sorts of welding equipment. This sort of equipment enabled a huge variety

of contract work to be undertaken on occasion.

To anyone with an aching back standing in front of the open door of the largest furnace for a few minutes was popular. The aches seemed to disappear. But one place everyone wanted to avoid was the cyanide hardening room, a small workshop operated by just one man. There, tools and certain parts of rolling stock undergo contact with cyanide to make them very hard indeed.

A Message From Dover And District Beekeepers' **Association**

Help is urgently needed to identify and report the Asian hornet. This arrived in France from China and has spread across Europe. It is not yet established in England but 6 nests have been found so far this year in Dover and Folkestone Districts. You may find it in your garden or in wasps traps – if you use them.

How can you report a sighting?

Take a photograph If in doubt go to: https://www.bbka.org.uk/ identify-asian-hornet

Contact your local Asian Hornet coordinator who will help you identify the insect using the map at: Asian Hornet Team map | British Beekeepers Association (bbka.org.uk)

If certain it is an Asian Hornet, download the Asian Hornet Watch App and follow the instructions. This is an easy way to report sightings.

Why will they be such a big problem?
Asian Hornets are more defensive than wasps and our native hornet. In other countries they are known to build their nests in sheltered sites such as sheds, roof spaces and garages, sometimes hedgerows and thickets. If their numbers increase, more members of the public will inevitably come into contact with them. Their sting is very venomous and people who normally do not react to wasp stings

have been known to be hospitalized.

Asian Hornets are known to feed on many different types of insects including butterflies, moths, beetles and many types of bees. Many of these are vital pollinators and also form a key part of the food chain for birds and small mammals. Loss of these insects will also cause loss of these birds, bats and other mammals.

Honey lovers. Asian Hornets also target honeybees. This will inevitably result in a reduced number of honey bees colonies and the associated honey crop.
